

## PE and Sports Premium Overview



<b>Overview</b>	<p>In 2013/14, the Government launched its Sports Premium funding initiative in order to help schools improve their PE and increase the sporting opportunities they offer pupils. This money is allocated to schools as a lump sum and an additional £10 per pupil. Schools are free to determine how best to use this funding to improve the quality and breadth of PE and sport provision, with the aim of increasing participation levels, improving the quality of provision and providing opportunities for competition.</p> <p>The following document aims to assess the success and impact of these objectives and outline the next steps for the development of PE at Fishergate Primary School.</p>
<b>Sports Premium Funding Allocation for this academic year.</b>	<p>Fishergate Primary School will have received £18,610 for the 2024/25 academic year. This was made up of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• A base grant of £16000</li> <li>• An additional payment of £10 per pupil. (NOR 261)</li> </ul>
<b>Our 2024/25 plans to spend this money</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Additional after-school club provision</li> <li>• To increase the variety and range of sports to which our children are given access to.</li> <li>• Ensure that all Y4 pupils take part in weekly swimming lessons</li> <li>• To continue to provide pupils with opportunities for competition at all levels through both inter-school and intra-school competition.</li> <li>• Provide opportunities for higher level competition through the sports partnership</li> <li>• Provide specialist sports coaches to support teaching and children's attainment in P.E.</li> <li>• Provide sport and P.E. equipment for lessons and play time</li> <li>• To provide leadership opportunities for children by creating a School Sports Council to ensure a 'pupil voice' about how Sports Premium is spent.</li> <li>• Increase opportunities for participation within extra-curricular clubs</li> <li>• Become an OPAL school</li> </ul>
<b>Desired impact of the plans for 2024/245</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Specialist coaching and planning develops staff skill and confidence and improves P.E. teaching through school</li> <li>• Specialist coaching provides strong provision for teaching and learning and more children take part in physical activity</li> <li>• High quality resources for P.E and playtimes are available throughout the year</li> <li>• More children take part in non-competitive and competitive sporting activities</li> <li>• School sports council are involved in decision making about resources and clubs provided. They can organise games and develop basic coaching skills.</li> <li>• More resources available for extended and varied extra-curricular activities programme.</li> <li>• All Year 6 pupils can swim 25m by the end of KS2.</li> </ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Improved opportunities for specific groups to increase participation, such as SEN, PP and pupils targeted as having 'inactive lifestyles'.</li> <li>• Pupil premium children participate in at least one sports club throughout the year.</li> <li>• Ringfenced a budget to support the implementation of OPAL improvement projects.</li> </ul>
<b>How we plan to make sure these improvements are sustainable</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Total Sports subscription and planning provides specialist coaching for our teaching and teaching assistants. This will ensure high quality P.E. teaching and learning in the years to come.</li> <li>• Total Sports after school clubs provides specialist coaching for the children, giving many the confidence to join clubs outside of school.</li> <li>• Investing in new P.E and play equipment ensures that quality of provision remains high.</li> <li>• Less active pupils are encouraged and taught strategies to access physical exercise and understand why good physical health is important. This raises their potential to be fit and healthy adults.</li> <li>• Becoming an OPAL school will mean that we have better, more active and creative playtimes which will mean happier and healthier children.</li> </ul>
<b>Impact of the Sports Funding 2023/2024</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Yr 1/2, 3/4 and 5/6 PE leaders were trained to use PE equipment, including setting out equipment before and after playtimes, to organise games and develop basic coaching skills.</li> <li>• Equipment audit completed and replacements bought for damages.</li> <li>• Autumn and Spring House competitions were delivered throughout school for Football/Hockey (autumn) and Tag Rugby/Netball (spring).</li> <li>• Fishergate School attended all Partnership competitions which were available.</li> <li>• Children completed audits at the start of the year to outline clubs they would like to attend within school these audits were then used to plan extra-curricular timetables throughout the year, in conjunction with partnership competitions and seasonal availability.</li> <li>• All children have accessed high quality P.E. lessons taught by specialist coaches.</li> <li>• Children with SEN are increasingly engaging with all aspects of P.E.</li> </ul>
